



Serving with Honor

On behalf of the sworn officers and civilian support staff members who collectively serve our community, it is once again my honor and privilege to share this annual progress report with the community. For an unprecedented fourth consecutive year, Part I Crime in the City of Racine dropped to a new low. After historic record-breaking reductions in 2013, 2014 and 2015, in 2016, Part I Crime in Racine dropped to the lowest level on record since Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) statistics were introduced in 1965.

While encouraged by the multi-year downward trend and current historic low in Part I Crime, we are mindful that, behind the data and statistical summaries are real people whose lives are impacted by crime and disorder. For this reason, while we pause to acknowledge the significant progress made to date, we remain vigilant, as our mission remains a work in progress. We are mindful that additional work and new challenges remain ahead. Through the professionalism of the men and women who serve as sworn officers, and with the ongoing support of area residents, local businesses, elected officials, church organizations and others, we are well-positioned to meet the challenges ahead and the changing public safety needs of our community.

In pursuit of our goals, we continue to engage with our community partners in an intentional manner, cultivating meaningful strategic community partnerships to accomplish our core mission. One such partnership is the new COP in schools initiative, introduced to transfer the success of the COP philosophy from the neighborhood level to the school environment.

In addition to serving with honor in the field, our members continue to serve on local boards, coach youth sports programs, mentor RUSD students and more, promoting community service and demonstrating servant leadership in the process.

We look forward to working with our community partners to build upon our success to date.

Deputy Chief John Polzin - Patrol Division

It is an honor to serve as Deputy Chief of the Patrol Division; working in the community where I was born and raised. The Patrol Division is the largest division within our agency, encompassing many shifts, units and teams, including; patrol officers, COP officers, traffic investigators, K-9 units, SWAT, Crowd Control Team and the Crisis Negotiations Team. All members of the division work collectively in cooperation with other divisions, local government, private partners and area residents to improve the quality of life and to provide a safe environment for the residents of our community.

Our vision statement as an agency is to: "create a safe and secure environment where residents enjoy a high quality of life." I would like to commend the men and women of the Racine



Police Department Patrol Division for their continued commitment to the residents we serve. Their devotion to our community is revealed in the hard work and diligence demonstrated on a daily basis. As an agency, we recognize the importance of the support and commitment our citizens provide. We are grateful for the many community partners who share in our organizational success.

Deputy Chief Mark Schulz - Support Services Division

It is an honor to serve as Commander of the Support Services Division. This Division is responsible for oversight of the Records, Court, and Evidence/Property Sections, Abandoned Vehicles, Technology, Radio Communications, Resource Department and Community Service Officer Section. The department's annual budget is also prepared under this Division, We also prepare grant applications and complete reporting requirements for state and federal grants awarded to the department.

In 2016, with the support of the City's Information Systems and Finance Departments, our Support Services team introduced online payment options for parking and municipal citations. This option provides a more convenient way for individuals to pay



municipal and traffic citations. CSO Officers further responded to approximately 3,000 calls for service in 2016, capturing 1,232 stray animals, towing 1,107 abandoned vehicles, issuing approximately 308 Municipal Code Citations, and over 12,000 parking citations in the process.

DIVISION COMMANDERS

Deputy Chief Todd Schulz - Investigative Division

It has been my honor and privilege to serve as Commander of the Investigative Division. This division includes General Investigations, the Special Investigations Unit (SIU), and the Major Crimes Unit. SIU personnel oversee drug and gang investigations and human trafficking investigations. General Investigations personnel handle a broad range of investigations, including robberies, burglaries, white collar crime, assaults, thefts, domestic abuse, sexual assaults, crimes against children, missing person cases and other investigations. With the increase in opioid deaths nationwide in 2016, local detectives targeted trafficking suspects, resulting in the arrests of numerous individuals.





Latin Disciple gang members and their associates were involved in drug trafficking, robberies, money laundering and violent gang activity. A major round up was conducted in October of 2016, resulting in the arrest of thirty individuals on federal charges. Also in 2016, our Human Trafficking task force recovered (56) trafficking victims. The task force also initiated an investigation into labor trafficking as well.

I am proud to work with the members of the Investigative Division who served the Racine community with dignity, professionalism and compassion.

Deputy Chief Charles Weitzel - Professional Standards Division

The Professional Standards Division is comprised of three units; Internal Affairs, Planning and Training, which collectively provide services vital to the Mission and Vision of the department. Internal Affairs Unit personnel oversee citizen complaints, compliance audits and disciplinary procedures. Training Unit staff members oversee the recruitment and field training of new recruits. Training Unit personnel also oversee annual in-service training as well as specialized training, ensuring that all officers maintain certifications for a wide range of state mandated training.

The Planning Lieutenant is responsible for coordinating a number of special events each year. The Planning Sergeant serves as the



voice of the department as the Public Information Officer. In addition to communicating with the media on a daily basis, the Planning Sergeant manages the departments social media content, and reviews and updates policies and procedures that guide the department's operation. The members of the Professional Standards Division are committed to continuous improvement in order to meet the changing needs of the citizens we serve.

Deputy Chief Al Days - New School Safety & Security Division

As one of the very first D.A.R.E. Officers to serve our community with the Racine Police Department, I am truly humbled and honored to finish my career in a position that allows me to once again serve the students of our community. In order for students to reach their full potential academically, athletically and socially, it is important that they are provided with a safe and secure environment where learning is not disrupted by crime and disorder.

As an extension of the community oriented/problem-solving policing philosophy, the new School Safety and Security Division was created in 2016. This division was added to the organizational



chart to transfer the best practices from the successful neighborhood implementation of the COP philosophy to the school district.

Similar to the manner in which high crime neighborhoods were targeted for renewal in the early 1990s, RUSD High Schools (and some Middle Schools) will now have designated school-based COP officers working in schools on a proactive basis.

The student and staff population of the local school district is the size of some small cities. The public safety needs of this unique population are however quite different, requiring policing strategies that are unique in nature and tailor-made for the school environment. In order to meet the unique and changing needs of our student population, RUSD and RPD administrators collaborated to create the new School Safety and Security Division.

School-based COP officers operate much like neighborhood COP officers; doing so during school hours. On a daily basis, school-based COP officers identify and solve problems, building positive relationships with students in the process.

As I conclude a long career with the Racine Police Department, I would like to extend a heartfelt thank you to those who supported me throughout my career.

All the best to the new generation of officers, commanders and supervisors who will lead our organization to the next level.

SCHOOL SAFETY & SECURITY



The year 2016 was a transformational period for school safety and security. Through a strategic partnership established between the Racine Police Department and the Racine Unified School District, a new School Safety & Security Division was created. Under this unique collaboration, our core public safety mission remained intact, with the addition of the following mutual goals:

- We will work in collaboration with RUSD officials to provide and maintain a safe, healthy and productive learning environment, where our officers serve as positive role models
- We will transfer the successful problem-solving Community Oriented Policing philosophy from the neighborhood level to the school environment
- We will build and cultivate positive relationships and interactions with the student body
- We will, where appropriate and productive, utilize alternative solutions to criminal sanctions

The first initiative introduced under the new police/school partnership was the Students Talking it Over with Police (S.T.O.P.) Program. During this 8-week course, officers meet with students to educate them on the proper way to conduct themselves during traffic stops or other police encounters. During this exchange, officers learn from the students as well, building trust and respect in the process.


Since being identified as one of the department's top-5 focus areas, burglary reduction continues to remain a high priority for all patrol shifts. While the majority of burglaries occur during daylight hours, patrol officers from all three shifts and our burglary investigative team have worked together

to contribute to the significant reduction in burglaries. In 2016, burglaries reached the second lowest total on record since Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) statistics were introduced in 1965. In 1974, burglaries reached an all-time high of 2617. In 2016, this number was reduced to 577, the lowest total on record since 1965 when 503 incidents were reported.

In 2016, third shift patrol officers continued the special assignement activity initiated in 2015, increasing investigatory field stops by 57 percent over 2015. Through focusing on proactive crime prevention strategies and order maintenance activities and through working in partnership with the community, a number of street-level crimes were prevented or reduced.

Initiated in 2013, the Tavern Enforcement Squad experienced its largest impact to date, with a 14% decrease in calls for service at taverns. Since its inception, this proactive initiaitve has achieved a 26 percent reduction in calls for service at local licensed establishments. Working in concert with responsible tavern owners and area residents, public safety has been significantly enhanced.

Overall, all patrol shifts work dilligently to create an environment where people feel safe and enjoy a high quality of life.





In support of the Patrol Division, General Investigations, and the Special Investigations (gang and drug) Units, K-9 Unit personnel responded to 3,291 calls for service in 2016. Due to the special capabilities of K-9 teams, they are regularly called upon to respond to burglaries in progress, robberies, open doors, alarms, narcotics in progress, fleeing suspects, wanted parties, and calls involving firearms and other weapons.

In connection to the many calls for service K-9 teams responded to in 2016, K-9 handlers conducted 528 searches of buildings, homes, vehicles, yards and fields. These searches resulted in 69 drug finds with multiple firearms being located. While performing an article search, K-9 Dozer located a firearm used in an attempted homicide case, a find that would have been significantly more difficult without K-9 assistance.

Through assisting officers in reaching peaceful conclusions under dangerous conditions, our department's K-9's increase officer safety and, by extension, our K-9 partners significantly enhance public safety.



COMMUNITY POLICING UNIT

Our Policing Philosophy at the Neighborhood Level

Community Policing in Racine remains an organizational philosophy, and not a policing strategy. In support of the overall goals, objectives and mission of the department, the officers assigned to the COP Unit contribute to the success of this philosophy on a daily basis.

Through the combined effort of the sworn members who serve our community, the Racine Police Department has received national recognition for the outcomes achieved under the community policing philosophy. In an era where law enforcement agencies across the nation are seeking to establish better police community relations, our department has become a model for what can be accomplished through the power of community partnerships and intentional community engagement.

In 2016, officers assigned to the COP Unit engaged in a great deal of teamwork, displaying integrity and leadership while carrying out their duties at the neighborhood level. In addition to addressing crime and disorder in designated COP neighborhoods, officers are instrumental in supporting a number of community engagement initiatives, including National Night Out, Juneteenth Day, Rotary Post Prom, Fourth Fest, First Fridays, and the Annual Cops N' Kids Fishing tournament to name a few.

At the neighborhood level, COP house officers continue to develop unique initiatives that meet the needs of specific communities. In 2016, West 6th Street COP Officer Tim Cisler continued to build on the long history of positive police-community relationships through engaging with area youth on a personal level. From a special outing to East Troy to learn about hunting safety, to the in-house bicycle repair shop where area youth learn how to repair their own bicycles, Officer Cisler and other members of the COP Unit are building trust and improving the quality of life for area residents.

The year 2016 was a particularly difficult year for the law enforcement community with the tragic deaths of five officers in Dallas, Texas and three officers in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. There were 135 line of duty deaths in 2016, the highest number recorded in 5 years.

In an effort to boost the morale of local officers in the aftermath of these tragic events, a group of police spouses initiated the "Adopt-A-Cop" officer appreciation initiative. Within a short period of time after launching this effort, the community responded in a meaningful way, adopting and providing every officer on the department with special personal gift baskets. What a great morale boost for our sworn members!

Equally significant was the special gifts made for officers by 8-year old Marcelino McKinney and his brother Michael McAllister. The two brothers created special crosses and blue and black wrist bands to honor and show support for local officers. To show their appreciation, several officers took the brothers out for pizza.



Through the leadership of the Racine Dominicans, in late 2012, the issue of human trafficking was brought to the forefront of our local consciousness. With the support of the Dominican Sisters, a small community awareness meeting quickly evolved into a community-wide movement in the fight against human trafficking.

In 2013, the Racine Coalition Against Human Trafficking (RCAHT), a group of volunteers led by Karri Hemmig, was founded to support the Racine Police Department in the fight against human trafficking.

Through a generous startup grant from the Racine Community Foundation, the RCAHT has assisted over 150 victims locally (56 victims in 2016). Working with various community partners including, but not limited to sexual assault services, SANE nurses, counselors, hospitals, USAO, legal advocates, school districts, churches and Crime Stoppers of Racine County, Inc., significant progress in the fight to end human trafficking has been achieved. Additional work remains ahead.






